should begin to examine options for life after high school, make plans for taking the necessary entrance examinations, and learn as much as possible about potential schools and financial aid, especially scholarships, available. Many myths exist regarding postsecondary education, so checking with a counselor to get some tips on how to begin and then refine the search is a great idea.

The PSAT will be given to juniors on Wed. October 12- testing from approx. 8 a.m. – 11:30 p.m.

Help Me!!!

One of the primary reasons that students struggle in school and risk failure is the fear of looking stupid. You know the feeling: "Everyone else already knows this and I'll look like an idiot if I ask." We all hate feeling ignorant, especially when the tacit expectation is that we *should* know. When coupled with teenagism, this fear can paralyze a student. So what's a parent to do? Here are a few tips:

1. **Gather Information**. Know what your student's grade is and why the struggle is occurring. If you are unclear as to why, contact the teacher via email or phone (see our website for staff contact information). The more you know, the easier it is to help. Make *Infinite Campus* your friend. - 2. **Talk.** Visit with your student. Ask for an explanation of the assignment and then tune in. An inability to share with you what they are learning indicates a need for assistance. Teachers are typically in the classroom by 7:30 before school, here until 3:30 after school, and available during seminar and by appointment. If your student can't explain it to you, they need some explanation from someone else.
- 3. Follow Up. Be sure that your student is doing what needs to be done by checking IC or contacting the teacher. Better to spend a little extra time now than to be scrambling like crazy in December. When the improvement happens, be sure to reinforce the positive change and the realization that it is rare for one person in a group to be the only one who "doesn't get it."
